Theme 1 Workplace organisation

01 Reps' functions and employers' duties

Employers try to restrict statutory functions of safety reps, fail to observe their duties to permit time-off, provide facilities & other assistance to enable safety reps' to function effectively. What must they do, how do we insist they do it?

02 Safety committees: what do we need? What sort of safety committees do we need to

What sort of safety committees do we need to meet our real needs & not allow employers to marginalise H&S issues into a toothless body? Should H&S be part of the main bargaining agenda? What are the key issues for unions?

03 Recruiting safety reps and improving workplace health & safety organisation

Examination of methods we can use to revitalise our branch/workplace organisation to recruit more safety reps.

04 Mapping our Organisation and our Activity

Comprehensive mapping enables identification of H&S issues we need to tackle and our organisational capacity to campaign and negotiate for improvements.

05 Inspections

The workshop focuses on preparing for regular workplace inspections; explains the resources and tools you need, plus checklist development; recording & reporting the results of the inspection and follow-up action.

06 Getting enforcement system to work for us

Government restrictions on enforcement limit what inspectors can do. There are fewer HSE and local authority staff, fewer proactive inspections. What can they still do & how do we get help from inspectors when we need it?

Theme 2 Dealing with risks

07 Identifying Hazards/Risk, Hierarchy of control

Risk assessment is the statutory foundation for employer working practices. Employer's duties, how to carry out risk assessment, the hierarchy of control and failures. How do we ensure safety reps play an effective role?

08 Mapping to reduce stress

Work-related stress can lead to long-term physical & mental ill health, end careers, even cause suicide. We will explore safety reps use of mapping tool to identify stressful factors.

09 Fire risk Inspections for fire precautions

Fire service enforcers are tough on employer failures to assess fire risks. What are the standards employers must meet? What guidance is available? How to get employers to ensure fire safety at work?

10 Toxics Reduction at work & environment

Exposure to cocktail of chemicals at work, home, and in the environment is making us ill. We need a strategic approach to eliminating & reducing our exposure using REACH, COSHH, Toxics Use Reduction, Zero Carcinogens, anti fracking, air pollution campaigns.

11 Investigating incidents and injuries

Good investigation ensures problems are identified and further harm is prevented. This workshop will look at the key steps for incident investigation, and give you the tools you need to undertake this function effectively.

12 Display Screens (DSE), mobile digital toolstablets, lap tops, phones, handsets & wearables

Identifying the hazards and risks from digital technologies, including musculo-skeletal disorders, stress, surveillance and control. How can the law help, how to assess the risks and organise to prevent harm.

Theme 3 Challenging Employers agenda

13 Punitive sickness absence management

Absence management procedures should support sick & injured workers not penalise them. We need good recovery and rehabilitation procedures. Is the 'Fit for Work' service good for us?

14 Resisting resilience & individual well-being schemes

Resilience and, individual well being, counselling & other schemes divert attention from collective preventative action. How do we re-focus on prevention & ensure reps are not diverted?

15 Behavioural safety

STOP programme, Golden Rules and 'Procedure for Corrective Actions, it's management speak for 'blame the worker'. This BS is a real threat to our survival. How do we recognise and resist it?

16 Excessive workloads

UK workers work the longest hours in Europe, & workload levels continue to increase. How can safety reps use stress standards & other tools, to monitor & control risks & unhealthy workloads? Will the enforcers help?

17 Bullying/surveillance & control versus dignity/respect @work

Employers use bullying, surveillance to control and undermine us. How do we identify the mechanisms, reveal the effects on our health & safety, and organise to demand dignity and respect at work

18 Precarious work

Zero hours, temporary contracts, agency work, outsourcing and low pay are spreading throughout UK workplaces undermining hard won H&S condition and standards. How do we use H&S arguments and methods to organise against them.

Meeting 1: Challenging the individual therapy view vs collective action to prevent work causing mental ill-health: Work stress is the cause of most work sickness, and employers are failing in their legal duty to prevent it. They focus on individual workers weaknesses not hazardous workplaces and systems. Employers promote engagement, mindfulness, resilience, counselling, first aid, rather than the legally required prevention, and HSE doesn't enforce it. Discussion on whether individual therapy can be effective for mental illness caused by work and social/political issues, and on organising collective responses in workplaces and outside.

Meeting 2: Towards zero work-related cancer: Work causes 8-16% of all cancers. The COSHH Regulations hierarchy of control stipulates the elimination of all substances such as carcinogens assessed to be hazardous to health, substitution, collective controls and PPE only as last resort. Poorly managed asbestos is a risk to workers in many work-places and in 80% of our schools. All work cancer is preventable, lets eliminate carcinogens and other hazardous substances at work.

Meeting 3: Using new methods of organising on health and safety —Sports Direct, Fast food, Zero hours, Uber, Deliveroo etc: Learning from those engaged in these new organising methods and how we can adapt them for health and safety issues and for different groups of vulnerable, exploited workers.

Organising health, safety & welfare in an insecure world

Hazards Conference is the UK's biggest and best educational and organising event for trade union safety reps and activists. It consists of a mixture of plenary sessions, meetings and a comprehensive workshop programme. Delegates have the opportunity to exchange experience and information with, and learn from, safety reps and activists from other unions, sectors and jobs across the UK. It's great craic too!

After seven years of government attacks on the health and safety system and trade unions, we face the challenge of stopping further removal or downgrading of health and safety laws, enforcement and worker/trade union involvement in the post Brexit negotiations and in any subsequent trade deal with the USA. The Tory Government has promised that workers rights will be protected in any Brexit deal with the EU, but provides no details.

Tory manifesto and philosophy is still to deregulate and slash red tape. Trump in USA has similar but even more aggressive business first and workers last policies. Any quickie bilateral treaty with the US, or other country, can only pose huge threats to workers' health and safety, wages and conditions, and is likely to damage us even more than TTIP. The European Parliament voted for CETA which must now be ratified by 28 member states. Colleagues from Hazards Campaign sister organisation in the USA, National COSH, will speak so we can discuss the common threats we face, how we can organise together against them.

In the UK the HSE's non-strategy #HelpGBWorkWell, criticised as 'no more than a social media hashtag' and 'business brochure', offers little for most workers but nothing at all to help the 75% of workers not in trade unions, those in bogus self-employment, on zero hours contracts, low pay and in the so-called 'gig economy' who dare not raise health and safety issues for fear of being sacked or victimised. As part of #HelpGBWorkWell, HSE has published a 'Work and Health Strategy', focusing on the three biggest causes of work-related ill health - Stress, MSDs and lung diseases. But this is also very weak, has no specific resources, fails to acknowledge and enhance the positive role of trade unions and workers, or the necessity for strict enforcement to make non compliant, criminal employers act to prevent work making us ill.

We cannot rely on the law or HSE, but as always, on our own education, organisation and agitation! Hazards 2017 will feature the many and vibrant acts of resistance and organisation by safety reps, unions and groups in this challenging environment to defend and extend good health and safety for members and other workers.
