 - Many employers support strong enforcement because they do not want undercut by competitors.
 - ➤ The HSE do some great work in some areas, but follow the government line on others.
 - The EU has given us a strong legal protection but are also now free-market and de-regulation obsessed.
 - Labour party says it now supports more inspection and work in occupational health, but its record in government was "mixed".

TUC Manifesto

- The TUC has taken the approach of trying to identify a number of issues that will make a major difference and build alliances over each of them separately.
- Published in TUC Manifesto "A time for Change"
- 10 practical issues that should attract a range of supporters.
- So the question is not "Who is on our side?", but "how do we practically build coalitions and support on issues.

- Europe. influencing Commission, Involvement in structures, ETUC, MEPs, lobbying, court cases.
- Press Some journalists V good on H&S, others will take up some issues if given a story. Daily Mail will often run cancer stories, Independent and Mirror asbestos, Guardian on cuts, Express women's issues. Local press.
- Politicians depends on the issue. Far less Labour MPs with a working background. Lib Dems and other minority parties - not on their radar. Tories..... Can make more progress in Scotland and Wales.
- Professional bodies, IOSH FOM, Council for Work and Health, BOHS etc. depends on the issue.
 - Biggest group our own members. Are they convinced of the case?
